Any request costing in excess of this should be refused. Unfortunately, the University's building management team does not hold this information in a reportable format.</p> <p>To ascertain the required details of each buildings zonal heating controls would require manual analysis of each building schematic in our system. Due to the number of buildings in our estate (35), and the level of detail requested, we estimate the costs of the required manual analysis would be in excess of £450.</p>

As such, it is not the artworks/artists we study which should be in focus here, rather the teaching methods. Staff create teaching environments which are inclusive and sensitive to the viewpoints of all participants. Students are encouraged to share concerns about artists/artworks and we make it clear that if they are uncomfortable with</p>

material or topics studied they are welcome to share their feelings and abstain from the discussion or content in that instance.

Students are encouraged to develop their own experiences, beliefs and identity in their own fine art practice, and staff create teaching environments which are inclusive and sensitive to a range of viewpoints. Students are encouraged to discuss their artwork and practice and this may include discussions around personal experience and viewpoints. Staff make it clear that if the student is uncomfortable with any discussion, material or topic they are welcome to share their feelings and/or abstain from the discussion or content in that instance.

Where students create artwork that may cause stress, discomfort, anxiety, emotional upset and/or trauma for other students, they are asked to discuss this practice with their tutors so that measures can be put in place to mitigate any risk (such as restricted view or peer group agreement).

Answer from Liverpool Screen School:

The Creative Writing programme and Creative Writing & Film Studies programme do not issue general 'trigger warnings' or content warnings. The study of Creative Writing involves analysing texts from writers from a range of eras, backgrounds and with a range of perspectives, and which discuss fundamental questions about identity and significant life experiences. As well as the classics, we look at recently published work and films that challenge stereotypes and increase understanding of a wide range of perspectives. We study the techniques of writing and film-making, and how engagement and response are evoked in the reader/viewer – noting that not everyone will have the same response to a text. Staff create teaching environments which are supportive, inclusive and sensitive to the viewpoints of all participants. We welcome challenge and debate.

Students are encouraged to share concerns about texts/films and we make it clear that if they are uncomfortable with material or topics studied they are welcome to share their feelings

For example, prior to a guest lecture by the poet Rebecca Goss, we provided a verbal content description of her collection 'Her Birth' as exploring the illness and subsequent premature death of the poet's young daughter. This allowed students who had experience similar circumstances to be prepared rather than overwhelmed. We consider this a basic courtesy to our students.</p> <p>In Film Studies & Creative Writing, Film Studies Tutors will leave any potentially difficult film clips until the end of a class. The tutor will introduce them explaining that this section of the film may be difficult to watch and if anyone is uncomfortable with this they may leave. For example, in Blackkkkiansman and Three Brothers by Spike Lee there is news footage of the death of George Floyd.</p>

Students may then explore these themes further in the Level 5 module: Colonial Africa, and Interpreting Conflict in post-colonial Africa, and End of Empire in Southeast Asia at Level 6.</p> <p>In specific regard to the legacies of slavery and racism, Dr Andrea Livesey is well established in this field, being a specialist in slavery and its legacies in the US and the UK. Livesey offers dedicated modules on Gender, Race and Slavery in the United States at Level 5, and Liverpool and Slavery at Level 7. This latter module explores Liverpool's history through its involvement in the Atlantic slave economy. In this module students research the legacies of slavery through the links that LJMU had to the slave economy. 		<p>Response with regard to LJMU English Programmes: Please find below an extract from the 'Self-Evaluation Document' written prior to the Review of the BA (hons) English Literature Programme in October 2022. This outlines work done to date in updating the curriculum, including, as indicated some</p>

prior consultation and projects with students, and staff working groups. As will be evident, this review was in terms of additions to the curriculum rather than redactions from it.

De-colonizing the Curriculum:

In 2019 and 2020, the English Department was awarded two successive 'Curriculum Enhancement Internships'. The first took the form of a student-led enquiry and audit into diversity in materials and content on the UG English Literature programmes. Its main findings relating to the programmes directly were:

- 1) The unspoken power of whiteness should be examined and challenged in the core curriculum. Race and diversity awareness should not be an optional consideration for HE students e.g. slavery and its legacies should be a key to understanding Literature in English from the 18th Century and beyond.
- 2) The placement of texts which treat race and diversity within the syllabus should be considered to avoid marginalisation and tokenism. We should consider arranging texts throughout the module to encourage/foreground discussion of these texts and in assignments, and provide resources to historicise and research these issues in particular areas of expertise.
- 3) Students and particularly BAME students should participate in the consultation regarding the equality, diversity and inclusion of curriculum content and its assessment, before any programme degree re/validation.

The second 'Curriculum Enhancement Internship' in 2020 addressed the implementation of these recommendations. It involved students and staff auditing and re-developing module materials to better reflect a diverse and de-colonized curriculum. Existing modules such as 'Body, Mind and Soul: Seventeenth-Century Literature and Culture', 'Postcolonial Writing', 'Poetry Matters', and 'Modernism' enhanced the diversity of their primary and secondary reading lists in response. In

		<p>these proposed programme outlines the new modules reflect this drive towards greater diversity and a decolonized curriculum. I would like these provided to me as total numbers that do not specify what year or case of which they originate. This is to protect the identity of the individuals involved in such cases. To give an example, I would like the information provided as such: “Between the academic years 2015/16-2020/21, there were 13 cases in which the respondent (the person reported) was male. Between the academic years 2015/16-2020/21 there were 6 cases in which the reporter was a staff member”

I would, also, like information as to the results of such cases (i.e. excluded from university, a fine, written warning, etc.) if it can be provided. I would like this information to be given in the same way as I requested the demographics i.e “Between the academic years 2015/16-2020/21, 4 cases of sexual misconduct resulted in a formal written warning”. I, again, do not want the information as to what year these cases were, or the specific demographics of these cases, just an overall total of outcomes over that period of time. This is again to protect the identity of those involved in such cases.

I would like the above information to be provided to me as electronic copies.

Student Code of Behaviour and Disciplinary Procedures

When allegations are made to the police, the case is dealt with initially under the *Applicant and Student Criminal Convictions Policy*.

Prior to September 2020, LJMU recorded cases of sexual misconduct investigated under the University’s Student Disciplinary Procedure in an easily reportable format. This information has been provided in the table below.

However, the University’s Student Governance team did not record the nature of the incident (i.e. Sexual assault) in Criminal Convictions Procedure and Student Complaints cases in a reportable data form prior to September 2020.

Section 12 of the FOIA puts a limit of £450 on the costs the university should need to incur in responding to a request for information. Any request costing in excess of this should be refused. Due to the volume of files held by the service over the years you have requested the costs of manual analysis would be in excess of £450.
